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<u>Crop Insurance Deadline Nears in New York for Spring Planted Crops, Micro Farm, and Whole-Farm Revenue Protection</u>

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RALEIGH, N.C., Feb. 15, 2023 — The USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA) reminds New York cabbage, corn, dry bean, forage seeding, fresh market bean, fresh market sweet corn, grain sorghum, green pea, hemp, potato, processing bean, processing sweet corn, processing tomato, soybean, spring barley and spring oat growers that the final date to apply for crop insurance coverage for the 2023 crop year is March 15. Growers also have until March 15 to apply for coverage under the Whole-Farm Revenue Protection policy, including Micro Farm coverage. Current policyholders who wish to make changes to their existing policies also have until March 15 to do so.

Federal crop insurance is critical to the farm safety net. It helps producers and owners manage revenue risks and strengthens the rural economy. Coverage for cabbage, corn, dry beans, forage seeding, fresh market beans, fresh market sweet corn, grain sorghum, green peas, hemp, potatoes, processing beans, processing sweet corn, processing tomatoes, soybeans, spring barley and spring oats is available in select counties. Growers are encouraged to visit their crop insurance agent soon to learn specific details for the 2023 crop year. Additional crops may be eligible for coverage under a written agreement. Crop insurance coverage decisions must be made on or before the sales closing date.

Crop insurance coverage for soybeans has been expanded for the 2023 crop year to include Delaware and Fulton Counties.

RMA is authorizing additional flexibilities due to coronavirus while continuing to support producers, working through Approved Insurance Providers (AIPs) to deliver services, including processing policies, claims and agreements. RMA staff are working with AIPs and other customers by phone, mail and electronically to continue supporting crop insurance coverage for producers.
